Once again, it has been a busy few months for the fairtrade activists in Carlisle, renewing the city's Fairtrade status and bringing a new group of prominent local businesses on board, a move that was celebrated at a successful event on 2nd March in the Quaker Meeting House. The annual Action Aid Coffee Break and a concert for local young people were also held during Fairtrade Fortnight, using coffee and music to promote Fairtrade messages. This group has gone from strength to strength in recent years and it will be one of several who will have access to and benefit from the new One World Centre which will be moving to an upstairs premises, above the World Shop, in early June. This expansion of COWC will be funded by a grant from Awards for All (under the Big Lottery Fund) and it will be an exciting time for the whole organisation.

We still don't have enough resources to run a full-time centre and will continue to work through the activities of you, our network and volunteer membership. Therefore, we hope you can make it along to our AGM on 14th of June to contribute your ideas towards the future of COWC and our new base.

As usual, this newsletter will combine a look back at the activities of recent months with notices and dates for your diaries. Since our last report to our network members there has been little in the way of embarking on new initiatives – it has been a period of consolidation and building upon our past achievements. It encourages all of us to realise that the Carlisle One World Centre is a successful enterprise. This is due in no small part to the support we receive from so many individuals and

other organisations. There's evidence of much commitment from a large group of like-minded people who see an imbalance in the way we use this

2007 Fairtrade Fortnight and Global Journey

There is a family behind every cup of coffee

At a Fairtrade wine reception in the Quaker Meeting House on Friday 2nd March, Sam Magona, a coffee farmer and chairman of the Gumutindo cooperative union Uganda presented certificates, to businesses that support Fairtrade in Carlisle. Mark Costello and Julie Mosley received the certificate for Carlisle CVS, explaining that they use Fairtrade tea and coffee and encourage all their member organisations to do so. Ian Proniewicz & Clare Scott from Orton Grange Farm Shop and Café are committed to sourcing local products fairly as well as products from overseas which we can't produce ourselves. They are now sourcing Fairtrade wine to offer as well as the tea, coffee and sugar already for sale in the shop and served in the café. Deborah Earl received the certificate on behalf of Carlisle Housing Association, the flagship company for the Fairtrade city. They host the meetings of the Fairtrade Steering Group. As well as offering Fairtrade tea and coffee to their employees, they even provide Fairtrade fruit. They are currently working on sourcing fairly traded uniforms. Denise McEwan, manager of Café Revive and Rachel Humphreys, commercial manager accepted the certificate on behalf of Marks and Spencer, dressed in M & S Fairtrade cotton jeans and tops. They explained that Marks and Spencer have been running a big promotion for Fairtrade Fortnight. They have increased selling from 9 to 70 Fairtrade products in the last year and aim to have fairly traded items for sale in many departments. All tea and coffee and a new range of jam and marmalade carry the Fairtrade mark. They brought examples of Fairtrade cotton socks and underwear and also handmade greeting cards from Salay in the Philippines, bought through Traidcraft.

Danielle Donougher who travelled with Sam Magona on behalf of the Fairtrade Foundation introducing him said, "Fairtrade is not a charity; it is a partnership between us and producers in the developing world, enabling people to have what they justly deserve."

Sam told us that it was the British who had introduced coffee to Uganda and that the Arabica coffee grown there originally came from Ethiopia, the birthplace of coffee. The high quality Arabica coffee is grown on the lower slopes of Mount Elgon. Most farms are one acre with the larger farms five acres in size. He showed us slides of the coffee being grown and processed and the improvements that they have been enabled to make in the process since



selling to the Fairtrade market. They had improved the quality of the coffee. Women no longer need to sit on the floor to sort the coffee, but can sit on stools by a conveyor belt to select the best beans. Women were involved at every stage and he said how their position had improved; they are now involved in decision making at all levels. And no longer do they have to carry great heavy sacks of coffee.

He outlined the many improvements they have been able to make using the Fairtrade social premium, an amount for social development over and above the fair price they have been given for their coffee. Housing has been improved – replacing mud and wattle walls with concrete and corrugated iron roofing. Two new classrooms will help reduce the class size of 200 shown in one of the pictures. Road surfaces had been improved to facilitate access on otherwise often impassable muddy tracks. Capped springs ensure a clean water supply. A health centre was built and local store was renovated. Improvements have been made on a budget of £1600 over seven years. He said that this could be done on such a tight budget because they did the work themselves.

Although coffee is the main source of income for 91% farmers, only about 5% of coffee is sold to the Fairtrade market. Sam was appreciative of the support of the Fairtrade Foundation and those who buy Fairtrade coffee. He would like to encourage more of us to buy his high quality Fairtrade coffee and assure them that it makes a great difference to his farmers and their families. Joe Human from the Keswick Fairtrade Group and Cumbria Fairtrade Network reminded us that there is a family behind every cup of coffee.

The evening, which was sponsored by the Co-op which is a major player in the sale and promotion of Fairtrade products in Carlisle, was regarded as a great success by Carlisle Fairtrade Steering Group.

A Fairtrade coffee morning at the Old Town Hall earlier in the day was well attended with local MP, Eric Martlew popping in for a cuppa. Joe Human and Sam Magona also spoke with Joe giving an account of a recent trip to Ethiopia by members of the Cumbria Fairtrade Network.

Music spreads the word at a Fairtrade Concert

On Wednesday 7th March, as part of Fairtrade Fortnight, a lively crowd gathered in the Tithe Barn, Carlisle for an evening of acoustic music with a trade justice message that wants a fairer deal for all. Gareth Davies-Jones a folk/roots artist, captivated the 50+ audience with songs and lyrics based on global responsibility and Christian faith. His lyrics challenged the audience to address the causes of global poverty and for each person to stand up for their beliefs. There was a strong sense that music can reach out to many and spread the trade and social justice message. People of all ages attended the event which was supported by local singer/songwriters Laura James (16) and Ben Mattinson (21). Both sang songs they had written based on their experiences accompanied by acoustic guitar.

Fairtrade bakes, tea, coffee, juice and hot chocolate were on sale in a Fairtrade café. The Co-operative Group, Christian Aid, Shared Interest and the Carlisle World Shop attended the event with stalls and information stands. As the Co-operative groups were offering free chocolate, they proved to be popular. Their simple message of 'changing the world, one can of beans at a time' inspired participants to join the fight for global trade and social justice. The lively music was broken up by short talks from representatives from Christian Aid, the Co-operative Group and the Carlisle One World Centre.

19 year old Becci Palethorpe, schools representative and Carlisle One World Centre volunteer, organized the event. She thanked her fellow Fairtrade volunteers and said that the evening demonstrated how, brilliant music with a clear message, can really reach out and get people thinking about eradicating poverty. She was delighted that so many young people had turned out for the evening. For £2, it was a wonderful way to celebrate Carlisle's second anniversary as a Fairtrade city, and a punchy fair-trade awareness raising event.

Global Journey reaches Carlisle



In January 2004 at the World Social Forum, from one of the poorest slums in Mumbai, India the International Fairtrade Association's (IFAT) Global Journey was launched. Since then, the banner bearing the Fairtrade Organisation's mark has travelled to all the countries where IFAT has members, promoting Fairtrade Organisations (FTO) and the FTO mark, as well as creating awareness of and showing solidarity with the Fairtrade global community.

Then on April 3rd 2007 it finally reached the North of England, and was transported from Newcastle to Hexham, and then on to Haltwhistle where it met representatives from Carlisle and Brampton. Fairtrade supporters from Newcastle, Hexham, Haltwhistle, Brampton and Carlisle stood together at the centre of Britain to listen as the IFAT declaration of Fairtrade was read, just as it had been read at every other Global Journey event, and to hear a local songwriter perform his song about Fairtrade. The groups then shared together in a wonderful lunch kindly provided

by the Newcastle Fairtrade Group, before the Carlisle group travelled back with the banner ready for the main event on April 9th.

On reaching Carlisle the banner was greeted with a day of celebration in the city centre. The day began when the Mayor, Cllr Peter Farmer, introduced by Jim Hyslop, read the IFAT declaration. He also spoke of his own and the Mayoress' personal commitment to Fairtrade. Fairly traded products were available to buy from a marquee situated in front of the bandstand, and the displays of street theatre certainly caught people's attention as they passed by. The day's entertainment included dance, drumming and an 'Unfair Tug of War', all performed by groups of local young people, as well as circus displays by 'Two High' and Samba drumming workshops led by 'Drum Roots'. Young people of all ages enjoyed entering into the Fairtrade banner competition, by decorating a square of material with their ideas about Fairtrade. The competition is to be judged in the near future and hopefully displayed somewhere in the city for all to see.

Overall, the event was a great success; it made a tremendous noise for Fairtrade, which hopefully has raised its profile in Carlisle, and was a fun day for all! Our thanks to Anna Templeton with Becci Palethorpe for all that they did to organise an event on this scale and to the many volunteers who worked hard to make it happen.

Update from the Campaigns Group

This new group has been very active in recent months. In addition to its involvement with the Global Journey, the following has been taking place....

World Water Day

Imagine that it is an hour before sunrise. You have to walk four miles to the nearest well to get enough water for your entire family's drinking, cooking and washing needs. The water is dirty and harbours diseases that may kill at least one of your children before they are 15. You now have to walk four miles back to your home, carrying the great weight on your head, in order to start your daily working routine. You will more than likely suffer permanent damage to your spine because you do this every day...

How much do you, living in one of the world's richest countries, appreciate clean fresh water running from taps?

Two-thirds of the world's households do not have any running water. In the UK, each of us uses between 200 and 600 litres of water in a day. Yet 1.1 BILLION people do not have daily access to even 20 litres. One person in the UK flushes 50 litres of clean water down the toilet in a day. In that same day 3800 children in the developing world have died from diseases associated with lack of clean drinking water and proper sanitation. That's 13 children dead in the 5 minutes it takes you to shower.

'Coping with Water Scarcity' is the theme behind this year's World Water Day on Thursday 22nd of March. It is an opportunity to rethink how we take our almost limitless clean water for granted, appreciate the scale of the problems for our fellow humans in the developing world and maybe figure out how we can reduce our own water consumption (a brick in the toilet cistern, turning off the tap while you shave or clean your teeth, etc.)

If you think that water shortage will never affect you because you live in Cumbria, think about where South East England may take its water from if last years 'drought' was a glimpse of things to come.

COWC Campaigns Group ran a stall in English Street on World Water Day. 40 people took information from the stall about Water Aid and World Development Movement. 10 of those people stopped for a more lengthy discussion.

We have recruited one volunteer who is interested in being involved in future events and one teenager took a huge stack of information to do a presentation to her school about water poverty globally. We also had a slot on BBC Radio Cumbria and articles in the press.

Climate Change and Trade Justice in Haiti

At a recent meeting, Prosperity Raymond, Christian Aid's programme officer in Haiti spoke briefly to us about Climate Change and Trade Justice in Haiti.

Climate change

Haiti and the Dominican Republic share an Island in the Caribbean. It is very beautiful but very poor. Global Warming has already affected it. In 2005 there were 23 storms instead of the usual average of 6. They used to suffer drought for 4 months a year every 7 to 8 years. Now it has increased dramatically. The sea is rising and they suffer a new phenomenon – tornados.

The poor are very vulnerable. Villages have been washed away in mud slides. Christian Aid is trying to help avoid floods. They are planting trees and trying to stop trees being cut down.

Trade Justice

Haiti has endured two structural adjustments by the IMF and World Bank. They insist on 'liberalising' trade, which means they must reduce import taxes. Liberalisation has meant that their government has had to stop subsidising their products, but US subsidised rice is dumped on them.

This means that Haiti used to export sugar and it is now importing sugar. In the 1980s they imported 15,000 tons of rice. Now they import 350,000 tins of rice. They produced 130,000 tons of rice and now they produce less than 75,000. 850,000 people lost their jobs after the second structural adjustment.

He asked us to lobby our government and the European Union. They should not impose conditionality on loans.

New Climate change group in Carlisle

A Friends of the Earth group has been re-established in Carlisle. It is a chance to network with other people who are concerned about how the climate is changing and work out what we can do about it at a local level. **The group meets every month** at 7.30, every fourth Wednesday of the month in the Greystoke Community Centre off London Road.

After the meeting in May there will be the opportunity to watch **Greenpeace's short film called "What are we waiting for"** an interesting film about decentralised energy, which shows concrete examples what other countries are doing.

Each meeting the group is collecting together information for a **Carlisle Green Guide**. So if anyone from the network has information which could be included in the guide, please let us know. Useful Web sites, personal experience, useful contacts.

Brampton Environment week June 4th – 9th

This partnership between the School and Sustainable Brampton will have 3 components:

1: The first element happens in school on Monday 4th June, with guest Speakers addressing years 7,8,9 about a range of environmental and climate related issues.

2: The second is the Public Debate, also to be held at W. Howard School, on Friday 8th June. The wording of the motion is not yet finalised, but will be about the merits of Brampton being less dependent on oil by 2020. (with local key speakers.)

3: The final component is "Sustainable Saturday" on the 9th at the Community Centre in Union Lane, a chance to invite all the Brampton and beyond community to an "Environmental Fair" to look at a range of sustainability issues and discuss future options. Stalls on a number of themes, will include organic and local foods (for lunch!), energy saving techniques by insulation, double or triple glazing , alternative energy generation demonstrations, (solar-panels, wood-burners, turbines, heat-pumps etc), water conservation, transport, waste disposal, local purchasing, and other themes.
